On Aug. 13 representatives from the Salem Five Bank, including the bank historian, were at the Brocklebank Museum to meet with Lew Harrold and Darlene Dupre to accept 20 large ledgers and a heavy brass plaque that are part of the history of the Georgetown Savings Bank, now Salem Five. They were particularly excited about the 1826 volumes which included the bank's opening shareholders and bank transactions, dated July 4, 1826. They even recognized some of the names. GHS was pleased to have these items go where they will be stored under proper archival conditions. Betsy Moran and Sylvia Johnston who brought them down from the Brocklebank second floor say that they are very heavy.

Our Archives

On July 12, Irene Gates, one of the Roving Archivists for the State of Massachusetts sent her report detailing what she had learned from her visit with several members of the Society on June 22. The visit and report were funded by a grant. In the report she praised the extent and breadth of the GHS collection and made specific recommendations regarding how we go forward digitally documenting and preserving the collection. Besides touring the museum and office, she was

shown the local history room at the Georgetown Peabody Library.

In keeping with her recommendations and our own research, GHS has purchased a reconditioned laptop computer, set up a network for data entry, and purchased the museum standard Past Perfect cataloging program. Lew Harrold is setting up the system for archival data entry so that volunteers and perhaps an intern can digitize the information about the collection thereby extending the work begun by former curator, Steve Keene. GHS is also looking into the means to preserve the paper and textile holdings that are degrading under present storage conditions. Once the system is up and running and procedures are in place, GHS will be looking for volunteers.

Museum

As Betsy pointed out in her letter, The Brocklebank Museum was open this summer. Hurrah! Between visitors, volunteers worked at cleaning, evaluating, and rearranging items in the rooms. For instance, some curtains found in the curator's office are now hanging in the parlor along with the portraits of Mr. and Mrs. Mighill on the mantle. The ell is straightened and has some room for items to be brought down from the overcrowded attic and evaluated.

Membership Report

As the 2021 membership year winds down, we can report that we have 87 members and 44 life members. This is similar to previous years, but the good news is that we have increased the number of active volunteers in the society and forged a connection with both the High School and the Library. We would be delighted if you could join us in making the Georgetown Historical Society a vibrant part of our community.

Garden

As you know, we have had rain and more rain this summer. Have you seen the abundant growth in our raised bed gardens? We would have had more success if we weren't also feeding some of the local wildlife. The corn, squash, and beans, for instance, were very popular with deer and rabbits. A woodchuck was caught eating the elderberries.

The apple and pear trees put on several feet of growth. We are now clearing behind them to make room for blueberries.

Have you seen the Victorian Garden in front of the parlor? Here we are striving for bold and gaudy. Did we succeed? We thank the Garden Friends of Georgetown for the daffodil bulbs from Judy Cunningham's beautiful yard.
